### **School Profile**

Bridgeport Elementary School is in the central region of Bridgeport and serves students in grades TK through eight following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year, 52 students were enrolled, including 22% in special education, 7.4% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 46% socioeconomically disadvantaged. Due to COVID-19, student assessments from prior years were assessed with the California Smarter Balanced Assessment Test, and California reports the following student scores for 3<sup>rd</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade:

#### **2019 Smarter Balanced Assessment Test**

- ELA: 14.7 Points below the Standard (20.1 Increase in Points)
- Math: 55.7 Points below the Standard (25.9 Increase in Points)

#### **2018 Smarter Balanced Assessment Test**

- ELA: 34.8 Points below the Standard (4.9 Increase in Points)
- Math: 81.5 Points below the Standard (18.2 Decrease in Points)

#### **2017 Smarter Balanced Assessment Test**

- ELA: 39.6 Points below the Standard (26.8 Decrease in Points)
- Math: 63.3 Points below the Standard (20.6 Decrease in Points)

**Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials (School Year 2020–2021)**

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Bridgeport Elementary School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Wednesday, August 26, 2020, the Eastern Sierra Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution #20-05 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARC's the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2020-2021 school year, Eastern Sierra Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional material to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

#### School Facility Good Repair Status

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Bridgeport Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1964; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests.

Every morning before school begins, custodians inspect facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and one evening custodian are assigned to Bridgeport Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Minor maintenance
- Grounds maintenance

Restrooms are checked regularly throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- General use areas
- Restroom cleaning
- Minor maintenance

The Principal and Director of Facilities and Maintenance communicate with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues. heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, and floor systems. During the fiscal school year, Antelope Elementary School did not qualify to receive deferred maintenance funds for campus repairs and/or improvements. A maintenance work order call-in procedure and log are used to communicate ongoing maintenance issues and problems.

### Facilities Inspection

The district's maintenance department inspects Bridgeport Elementary School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Bridgeport Elementary School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place in December 2020. No

emergency repairs were needed, and no unsafe conditions were found. During the fiscal year 2020-21, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use.

### Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the principal and several staff members are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas and the playground. During recess and lunch, the staff supervises playground activity and lunchtime activity in the cafeteria. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, the principal and staff monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure.

Bridgeport Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

### School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Bridgeport Elementary School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff in August 2020.
